- A. Hook: Start your essay with a strong statement or an anecdote that will grab the reader's attention and make them want to read more

- II. Body Paragraph 1
- A. Topic Sentence: Introduce the first point of discussion for this paragraph
- B. Evidence/Supporting Ideas: Provide evidence from reliable sources or personal experience that supports your first point
- C. Explanation/Analysis: Explain why this evidence supports your first point
- III. Body Paragraph 2
- A. Topic Sentence: Introduce the second point of discussion for this paragraph
- B. Evidence/Supporting Ideas: Provide evidence from reliable sources or personal experience that supports your second point
- C. Explanation/Analysis: Explain why this evidence supports your second point
- IV. Body Paragraph 3
- A. Topic Sentence: Introduce the third and final point of discussion for this paragraph
- B. Evidence/Supporting Ideas: Provide evidence from reliable sources or personal experience that supports your third point
- C. Explanation/Analysis: Explain why this evidence supports your third point
- V. Conclusion
- A. Summary: Summarize the main points of your essay

- B. Reiteration of Thesis Statement: Restate your thesis statement in a way that emphasizes how it has been proven throughout your essay
- C. Closing Sentence/Thought-Provoking Question: End your essay with a meaningful conclusion or thought-provoking question to leave your reader with something to think about

- A. List all the sources you used the given format.
